### College ranking climbs 18 spots to 24th in U.S.

The UF College of Education improved 18 places in *U.S. News and World Report's* latest

national rankings of America's Best Graduate Schools to 24th among all public graduate education colleges. The College is Florida's highest ranking education school, is No. 1 among public education schools in the Southeastern Conference, and is UF's highest ranked graduate college in any discipline. The College ranked 34th overall.

The College also had four academic programs ranked in the top 20 in their specialty areas:

- Special Education (No. 4)
- Student Counseling/Personnel Services (9)
- Elementary Education (18)
- Curriculum and Instruction (19)



#### 'Smart classroom' moves teacher prep into 21st century

Aiming to bring teacher education into the 21<sup>st</sup> century, the College is converting a vintage 1979 reading clinic in Norman Hall into a prototype "smart" classroom, where professors incorporate the latest education technology into their teaching to transform student learning and increase teacher-student engagement. The reinvented classroom will feature touch-screen SMART boards, large-screen computer monitors and "collaborative thinking stations" with seven movable media pods outfitted with iPads and laptops.





Education faculty and staff with the college's Lastinger Center for Learning joined Florida's Office of Early Learning in developing and field-testing 13 online professional development modules for the state's 40,000 early childhood educators. Although sophisticated, the modules are intuitive and built for the novice e-learner. The modules will allow diverse professional development organizations—including early learning coalitions, provider associations, family home childcare providers and community colleges—to share best practices with their colleagues and experts in communities of practice.



The spring dedication of P.K. Yonge Developmental Research School's new, technology-enhanced elementary wing marks completion of the first phase of total campus revitalization for the long-time UF laboratory school. The addition is set up in a learning community model. Traditional closed-off classrooms are replaced by learning studios with transparent walls, common areas and media centers. Computer labs are replaced by wireless devices such as laptops and tablets. "The integrated technology will teach students how to make good decisions on the Internet and make global connections for research and communication as part of their coursework." said PKY Director Lynda Hayes.



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## Students in Action

We're training the next generation of scholars in Early Childhood Studies



The federal Institute of Education Sciences, the Education Department's research arm, awarded \$750,000 to the UF Center for Excellence in Early Childhood Studies to support the recruitment of four postdoctoral fellows for two years of intensive training in early intervention and early learning in young children with disability conditions or risks. The fellows will be mentored by senior faculty and play major roles in the Center's growth and national reputation.

Continuing steady growth in distance learning enrollment last year brought together diverse and farranging students from around the world. They ranged in age from 18 to 65 and hailed from six countries, 25 states and some 200 Florida cities and towns. The College's overall curriculum entailed 675 courses—with 114 (17 percent) fully online and 279 (41 percent) a "blended" mix of face-to-face and online instruction. The percentage of individual students enrolling has risen 45

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percent in two years.

Revamped ed tech degrees can lead to multiple career paths



The College is refocusing its two advanced degree tracks in educational technology to reflect the field's versatility and application to many different professions. The two newly-named tracks—"Technology in K-12 and Teacher Education" and "Instructional Design and Management"—highlight how the master's and doctoral degree programs in educational technology can prepare individuals for any of several careers including K-12 education, teacher preparation, higher education, instructional design, and faculty development.



## Discovery with Impact



### Findings: change is good ... for boosting research

With progressive, new leadership, the College continues to enhance its educational research infrastructure and pursue new external funding opportunities for faculty research. Last year, a full-time grant writer was hired for support and consultation, and a new faculty professional development series covers vital topics such as disciplinary scholarship, research design

and analysis procedures.

The changes are helping COE research faculty build an impressive track record for winning large, competitive grants:

- The College's strengthened research enterprise last year generated \$25.8 million in new grants and contracts.
- UF education faculty last year averaged more than \$294,000 each in research funding.
- College faculty last year held 19 federal and state grants of \$1 million or

more—nine of them in special and early childhood education.



#### Endowed professorships yield big return on research investment

The College's two newest endowed faculty posts are responsible for the 2010 creation and burgeoning growth of the UF Center of Excellence in Early Childhood Studies. World-class scholar Patricia Snyder was recruited to UF as the center's founding director and holds the David Lawrence Endowed Chair in Early Childhood Studies. Matching funds for the million-dollar Anita Zucker Endowed Professorship, created in 2011 (and not yet filled), have bolstered the center's early staffing and infrastructure development.

An impactful return-oninvestment is also evident in the promising research underwritten by two of the College's longstanding endowed professor posts . . .



### Reducing disruptive class behavior

Special education professor Stephen Smith in August received a prestigious, threeyear appointment to the Ir-



ving and Rose Fien Endowed Professorship. The endowment will enable Smith to expand on his 15 years of studies into new teaching tools and strategies for helping students self-regulate their disruptive, anti-social behavior in the classroom.



#### Helping English language learners succeed in school



While holding the College's B.O. Smith Research Professorship, Ester de Jong, a faculty scholar in bilingual and ESOL education, is testing new strategies that elementary teachers can employ to help young English language learners bridge the "academic language" gap in order to succeed in school.



## Center for Excellence in Early Childhood Studies

This campuswide, interdisciplinary center, created in 2010, works to advance knowledge, policy and practices in early childhood studies. UF scholars in fields as diverse as education, medicine, law and the life sciences work with local, state and national partners to advance early learning opportunities and healthy development for our youngest children.

### Lastinger Center for Learning

This education innovation incubator harnesses the university's intellectual resources and partners with educational organizations across the state, and beyond, to develop and field-test learning system models that transform teaching, improve learning and promote healthy child development.



#### National Center to Inform Policy and Practice in Special Education Professional Development

Under a \$2.5 million federal grant, UF researchers at NCIPP are studying and introducing new strategies for helping states and local school districts improve the retention and quality of beginning special education teachers.

### P. K. Yonge Developmental Research School





## Key Initiatives





#### Statewide effort bolsters science, math education

UF's College of Education is taking unprecedented steps to ease Florida's dire shortage of science and math teachers.

The College's *UFTeach* program employs novel recruiting methods to enlist the university's brightest science and math majors and prepare them to teach effectively through early and intensive field experiences in real classrooms.



The COE now is making sure the training and collegial support of teachers-in-training continues after graduation. Faculty professors have received \$2 million from the Florida Department of Education to oversee the development of statewide teacher induction programs supporting new science and math teachers in their first two years on the job. Induction includes online and face-toface mentoring, professional development and networking opportunities.

To coordinate the effort, the College has established a program called Florida STEM-Teacher Induction and Professional Support, or Florida STEM-TIPS for short. (STEM is short for science, technology, engineering and math.)

"We aim to reverse the lack of induction support that historically drives nearly onethird of new teachers from the classroom by their third year," said Griffith Jones, a UF science educator and principal investigator of the grant.





"Children begin learning from the moment they are born. Yet one in three children enters school unprepared to learn and many never catch up," says Patricia Snyder, world-class scholar and founding director of UF's Center for Excellence in Early Childhood Studies.

That's why Snyder, who holds the David Lawrence Jr. Endowed Chair, led the College's drive to establish the campuswide center in 2010. It

has quickly gathered momentum, fostering collaborations between top UF scholars in fields as diverse as education, medicine, law, public health and the life sciences.

The Center brings together the science and technology of early childhood studies, a high-quality early learning program, child and family support services and community outreach to support young children's health development, early learning and well-being. All four campus locations of Baby Gator Child Development and Research Center serve as the hub for testing and demonstrating early learning practices.

## Molding master teachers for vulnerable schools

The College and its renowned Lastinger Center for Learning completed a second year of expanding the award-winning Master Teacher Initiative to early learning teachers in Miami-Dade County public schools through a highly competitive, \$6 million "Investing in Innovation" (i3) federal grant. The program allows practicing teachers to earn graduate degrees in early childhood education and teacher leadership, blending on-site and online coursework while remaining on the job and at no cost to them.



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
