Poster Session: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer (LGBTQ+) clients often turn to religion when navigating their intersecting sexual orientation, gender, and religious identities. However, many LGBTQ+ individuals experience force, rejection, and coercion, also known as religious abuse from their religious leaders and doctrine. This poster session describes the phenomenological experiences and themes of religious abuse by reviewing a qualitative study that utilized classical content analysis.
